Southern Peach Cobbler

Ingredients:

8 fresh peaches - peeled, pitted and sliced into thin wedges	
1/4 cup white sugar	1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup brown sugar	1/4 cup white sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon	1/4 cup brown sugar
1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg	1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice	1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cornstarch	6 tablespoons unsalted butter, chilled, cut in small pieces
	1/4 cup boiling water

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C).

In a large bowl, combine peaches, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, nutmeg, lemon juice, and cornstarch. Toss to coat evenly, and pour into a 2 quart baking dish. Bake in preheated oven for 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine flour, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/4 cup brown sugar, baking powder, and salt. Blend in butter with your fingertips, or a pastry blender, until mixture resembles coarse meal. Stir in water until just combined.

Remove peaches from oven, and drop spoonfuls of topping over them. Sprinkle entire cobbler with the sugar and cinnamon mixture. Bake until topping is golden, about 30 minutes.

Ouch! What Bug Bit Me?

Bug bites are frustrating and irritating — and can be harmful. Some bites and stings, like those from fire ants, wasps, hornets, and bees, are painful. Some can also spread illnesses, such as Lyme disease (black-legged tick), Rocky Mountain spotted fever (dog or wood tick), and West Nile virus (mosquito). The bites of other bugs, such as mosquitoes, mites, and fleas, are itchy and uncomfortable, but usually harmless. Learning to identify a bug bite by how it looks and feels will help you know whether to seek medical attention immediately or treat the skin bump at home.



Mosquito: Very itchy round, red, or pink skin bump.



Bed bug: Raised, red skin bump or welt that is intensely itchy and inflamed.



Spider: Red skin, swelling, and pain at the bite site.



Brown recluse spider: Painful bruise or blister with a blue-purple area around it; becomes crusty and dark.



Tick: Skin rash in rings (bull's-eye) appearing up to a month after bite, fever, fatigue, headaches, muscle and joint aches, and irregular heart rhythms.



Flea: Small, red skin rash, may bleed, itching (possibly severe), hives, and swelling; in groups of three or four on ankles, armpits, waist, bends of knees and elbows.



Bee: Sharp pain, aching; red skin bump with white around.



Lice: Tiny red skin spots on shoulders, neck, and scalp.



Ant: Painful red skin bump.



Mite: Intense itching, red marks look like a skin rash.



Scabies mites: Rash that looks like acne pimples and intense itching.

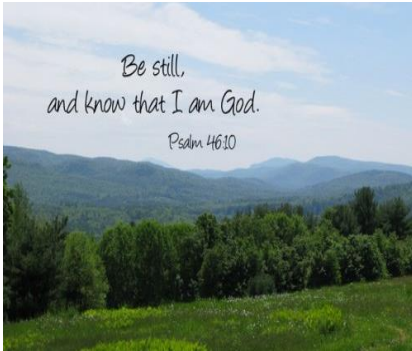
Home Remedies:

- For most bug bites apply ammonia with a cotton ball or a Q-tip and dab where you were bit. The ammonia stops the itching, takes away the swelling and redness instantaneously.
- Put ice cubes or frozen spoons on the bug bites (frozen spoons work better) or Caladryl to temporarily relieve pain and itching.
- Take a warm bath/shower to open skin pores and allows some toxins to escape. Then rub mentholated cream (Vicks vapor rub, Carmex lip balm) to sooth itching and swelling (will burn a bit if skin is broken).

Farm Bill Issues

The 2013 Farm Bill was defeated in the House in June - the first Farm Bill in history to be outright rejected by a legislative body. Congress will consider the Farm Bill upon their return in September. The 2008 Farm Bill expired September 30, 2012 was extended until September 30, 2013. The largest conflict is the funding of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (food stamps). Many Democrats believed that cuts to SNAP went too far and Republicans thought that the cuts didn't go far enough. An amendment passed just before the vote that applied federal welfare work requirements to the SNAP program which did not sit well with many House Democrats who overwhelmingly voted against the bill.

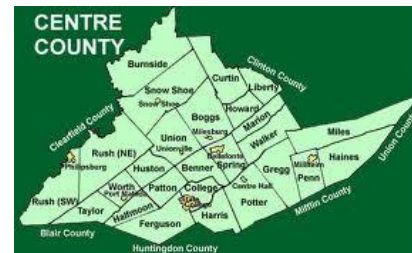
