From the Patron's Chain:

Facebook is increasing its number of users every day. It is currently the largest social media platform in the world and helps us connect to fellow Grangers from across the state. While social media can be a drag to some people it is time to reframe your thinking and see it as a tool for your Grange!

Facebook is a great tool for getting the word out about events and other local projects your Grange is participating in, for member recruitment, and connecting with fellow likeminded individuals.

Ever had the idea to host an event, and you weren't sure how you were going to advertise, or reach people in other districts? Well Facebook has this amazing tool that helps you create your own event, and even assists in getting the word out to your community, and further. By posting this information local

members of your community can see it through geotags, this helps in advertising. Creating an event on Facebook can also help with transparency. Transparency is particularly important when hosting events, that way people know basic things like where and what time the event is, while also showing what the event is supporting and who the funds from the event directly benefit.

Facebook can also benefit your Grange by recruiting new members while making impactful connections. Facebook supports in the reengaging of lost, potential, and uncertain enrollments. While often we hear that Facebook can become an echo chamber due to its algorithm, it can also help you connect with members of your community. Through Facebook you can message people within your community and invite them to Grange meetings, or even your local events to get them involved. After COVID-19 more people than ever are looking for something to do, and people to meet. People who are posting in your local community garden page, or local community service pages are the perfect people to network with, to build your Grange numbers. Sometimes all it takes is one invite to an event to get a new member of your Grange.

State Lecturer, June Unruh:

Snapping turtles are named for their method of biting. They are noted for their large size and aggressive nature. They are tan to black in color and have a rough upper shell, a long tail, and a large head with hooked jaws. The female can lay up to 20 to 40 eggs. Snapping turtles are valued for their food (Snapper Soup), which is quite delicious. It is usually unaggressive in the water; however, it may lunge and snap while on land. This is the time of year they lay their eggs. You may have seen them crossing the

road during your travels. Snapping turtles can live anywhere from 30 to 50 years.

The first week in June, I found a female snapper turtle in our back yard, which is quite common for us since we live on the Blackbird Creek, preparing to lay her eggs. So, I pulled up a chair to observe. It was quite interesting to watch. The whole process took approximately an hour. I "snapped" a few pictures which I would like to share with you. She had already started digging the hole to deposit her eggs when I spotted her in the back yard. She uses her back legs, alternately, to dig the hole. Her body is close to the ground while digging...when the hole is deep enough, she raises her body and starts to lay the eggs. I counted at least 20 eggs deposited into the hole. When she had finished laying, she started to cover the hole with the dirt that she had removed from the hole using her back legs alternately again.

She started to leave but she spotted me and walked around that area 3 times protecting the area. (I figured that I was her predator). When I walked away for a few minutes, she had walked away and I didn't see her anymore. I then covered the spot with a piece of screen and placed a few heavy stones on top of the screen so no animals could dig up the eggs. This fall, probably late August or September, I hope to find some little snappers crawling from that area. If we do, we pick them up and gently place them back into the marsh to start their life.
