> * Women had been given full membership. However, the youth were another matter. At first young ladies (age 16) and young men (age 18) were given the opportunity to join with full membership privileges. The age limit

was then changed to allow both men and women full membership at the age of 16. In 1880 the National Grange amend the Constitution to reduce the age to 14, which stills stands today. (see pg 208, The Grange Friend of the Farmer 1867- 1947 by Charles M. Gardner)
