Veterans Update.

Am I eligible to file for VA disability compensation?

Veterans that have an illness or injury that was caused by or was aggravated by active military service may be eligible to file for compensation benefits through the VA. Veterans are eligible to file a claim if they have a current illness or injury that affects the body or mind and they served on active duty, active duty for training or inactive duty for training. Additionally, at least one of the following statements must be true:

You were injured or sick while serving in the military and can link this condition to your current illness or injury.

An illness or injury that you had prior to your military service was made worse by your military service.

You have a disability related to your active-duty service that didn't appear until after you ended your service.

Some examples of VA disability claims are: hearing loss, PTSD, certain cancers, depression, ulcers, and anxiety. Woodie Guthrie,

Bonneville Power Administration

& The Grange

Elmer Buelhler, a Grange member, was given the task of chauffeuring Woody Guthrie around the Columbia Gorge area and beyond. Mr. Guthrie was given the task of writing songs for the Bonneville Power Administration. Woody had never stepped foot in Oregon until that faithful assignment. BPA was only 3 years old and competing with private utilities.

The Bonneville Power Administration wanted a way to reach the "common man" and they hired Mr. Guthrie to write 26 songs in thirty days .

The plan was to incorporate Mr. Guthrie's songs into a feature film showing what the dam could do for the Northwest. The following December, Pearl Harbor was bombed and the U. S. was thrown into World War II. After the war the Eisenhower administration ordered all the films to be destroyed.

Elmer Buelhler was ordered to do the incinerating but kept one copy for himself. This copy that was saved from destruction was used to create "Roll on Columbia, Woody Guthrie & The Bonneville Power Administration" documentary.

Before Elmer Buelhler had the chance to chauffeur Woody Guthrie. Oregon had yet another Grange member playing a vital role in the formation of the Bonneville Power Administration.

Congressman, Walter Pierce not only served as Oregon's Governor from 1923 – 1927 but served on the Oregon State Grange Executive Committee 1930 – 1934. At the age of 72 Walter Pierce was elected to Congress, serving his terms during the Roosevelt years. Walter Pierce was founder of the Public Power League and an advocate for using the Columbia River for hydroelectric power. His belief in public power help influence the direction the Bonneville Power Administration would take.

"PUD – Congressional Inquiry Needed" - Oregon State Grange Bulletin – September 20, 1944



The State of Washington was the first state in the nation to allow voters to form Public Utility Districts (PUDs). Passage was a monumental task when you consider what the people were up against and what the private utility companies stood to lose. Gus Norwood (in his book "Washington Grange Celebrate a Century) wrote that the Grange set up headquarters in the Railway Exchange Building in Seattle to gather signed petitions. When they arrived the following morning, they found the office raided and the petitions missing, they then moved the petitions to safety deposit boxes. However, some of the volunteers took the petitions to the power company and returned with copies of the originals, rendering them useless. Despite the opposition, more than 60,000 signatures were collected to send initiative No. 1 to the Legislature, allowing rural communities to form PUDs. The Legislature failed to act and the measure went to a statewide election, where it passed in 1930 with 54% of the vote.

Oregon was right behind Washington in adopting the formation of PUDs. In 1931 the Oregon Legislature implemented ORS 261. Today the State of Washington has far more PUDs than Oregon. The small number of PUDs in Oregon may be due to the fact that electric rates where low and the resistance the private utility companies put up (*see – PUD – Congressional Inquiry Needed, – Oregon State Grange Bulletin, September 20, 1944*). Locally our Grange District No. 3 contains half of Oregon's PUDs. Tillamook was the first to achieve a PUD, with county voters' approval, on July 23, 1933. However, the first hookup was not until October of 1946. Clatskanie followed with operations beginning in 1943. The Columbia River PUD can trace its origins to November 18, 1939 when 65 residents met at Beaver Homes Grange hall, although service was not started until 1984 when the Columbia River PUD (see: <u>https://www.crpud.net/</u>) began providing service to 6,500 customers.

Oregon's six Public Utility Districts are members of Oregon People's Utility District Association (OPUDA – see: <u>http://www.opuda.org/</u>). The purpose of the association is to provide a forum for the member districts to discuss national, regional, state and local issues of common concern and to formulate position on those issues. In 2009 the president of the OPUDA was Carol Everman, Secretary of Beaver Valley Grange and Columbia Pomona Grange at the time.

Today, Grange members still have opportunities to build upon our legacy of advocacy. As community members, we are constantly finding ways to be involved and making this a better place to live.
